Forthcoming: A Pastoral Letter on Parish Alignments

In the next week or so, Catholic households in the Archdiocese of Detroit will be sent a copy of Archbishop Vigneron's pastoral letter on *Together in Faith, Phase Two*. "Forward in Hope to Share Christ" addresses the life of the Church in the Detroit archdiocese.

"We cannot simply continue without significant changes," the archbishop writes. "This new situation we face together calls forth from us a new resolve and a new approach to fulfilling our God-given mission of proclaiming the Gospel and helping others to enjoy the great blessing we enjoy — life in Jesus Christ."

Accompanying the pastoral letter will be Archbishop Vigneron's decisions on parish alignments, informed by recommendations from lay leaders, the Archdiocesan Pastoral Council, and consultations with others including pastors and the auxiliary bishops.

Plans specific to our own parish and vicariate, in context with the seven mission priorities of *Together in Faith*, will be included in the mailing. Details for every parish in the archdiocese are scheduled to be posted Monday afternoon, February 20, at www.aodonline.org/TogetherInFaith.

Family Bible Study

The Gospel today begins with Jesus healing a man with leprosy. Leprosy is a disfiguring, infectious skin disease that has been surrounded by many social and religious taboos throughout history. In Jesus' time, the Law of Moses provided for the examination of skin diseases by the priests, and if leprosy was identified, the person was declared unclean and had to live in isolation from the community. They were instructed to rip their clothes and to announce their presence with loud cries when moving in the community. If the sores of leprosy healed, the Law of Moses provided a purification rite that permitted the person to return to the community.

In today's Gospel, the man with leprosy approached Jesus and asked for healing. His request to Jesus can be interpreted as a courageous and daring act. The confidence of the leper in Jesus' ability to heal him is evident in the words of his request. While healing the man, Jesus touched him, which also violated established social norms. This is an important sign of the depth of Jesus' compassion for the man.

He instructed the man not to tell anyone about the cure and told him to present himself to the priests as prescribed by the Law of Moses.

Mark's Gospel tells us that after this healing, it became difficult for Jesus to

travel freely. There are several possible explanations for this. There might have been concern about Jesus touching the man with leprosy, Jesus made himself unclean. However, Mark's story leads us to the conclusion that Jesus' movement was hampered by his popularity. Despite his instructions, the cured man spread the word about Jesus' healing power. Even when Jesus was in deserted places, people sought him out in search of his healing.

Today's Gospel invites us to think about the choices we make as individuals and as a family. Jesus was faced with a choice. By choosing to heal the man with leprosy, Jesus showed God's compassion for the sick and the outcast. The man knew that Jesus had a choice and that Jesus could reject his request.

In the person of the man with leprosy, we see an image of all those in need. The sick and the outcast of our world are watching us, to see if we as Christians will choose to extend ourselves to others in need of healing and compassion.

Talk about some of the choices you have made as a family. How does your family go about making these decisions? What do your choices communicate to others about your family's values? All our choices reflect our faith, and others are watching.

In prayer together, ask God to help your family show compassion to others in your family decisions.

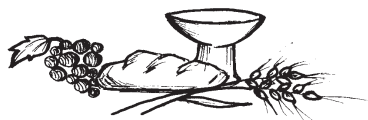

In Jesus' time, leprosy was seen as punishment for sins involving speech, such as gossip and slander. People thought that persons with leprosy could contaminate others, so they were separated from the community for the good of all. Quarantined from healthy members of society, lepers were considered the living dead.

Although forbidden to do so, one leper had the courage to reach out to Jesus, pleading, "If you will to do so, you can cure me!" Although contact with the man rendered Jesus ritually impure, he did something no one else dared to do. He touched the leper, saying, "I do will it. Be cured!" Jesus warned the man not to tell anyone lest the deed appear as mere wonder-working. But the man could not restrain himself and joyfully told everyone of his healing.

We are all in need of healing, all we have to do is ask and believe. (Excerpts taken from Ministry & Liturgy)

Christian Service

There is not anyone who likes to be left out or excluded. Maybe you have felt like that at one time or another. In high school young people struggle to belong to the right group, wear the right clothes, to be invited to the right parties. To be excluded is terrible. To be excluded makes us feel as if we are a failure in life.

Many people live everyday as outsiders, perhaps not because they choose to or even want to but it just happens to them. Single men and women, widow and widowers go home to empty and lonely homes. Bag ladies and homeless men and women wander in the streets of our cities. Many have mental, emotional and physical problems not knowing which way to turn. Feeling isolated from one another during vulnerable times is one of the heaviest crosses to bear.

The readings before the season of Lent speak to us about illness and healing and a horrible disease called leprosy. The Israelites forced the leper to live on the outside of society, away from family and friends. They not only felt the exclusion of others but also felt that God had cursed them with their disease because of their sinfulness. They even hated themselves because of this belief.

It took a great deal of courage for the leper to approach Jesus. Kneeling down he begged: "If you will to do so, you can cure me". And Jesus, moved by pity and compassion for this suffering brother stretched out His hand and healed the leper. The leprosy left him at that moment. An outsider was made to feel as though he belonged. Jesus touched the most untouchable of all people, a leper.

Each day we are challenged to reach out and touch the untouchables in our society. We are to break down those barriers that separate us, those walls of pride, selfishness, judgment of others and fear so that no one is an outsider, nor ever feels alienated from God's care, concern and love. As Paul reminds us through his letters, we are all one in the Body of Christ, loved by our Father.

We are to recognize that all people, no matter what color, creed or station in life, are our brothers and sisters in the Lord.

Take action! Support the 'Respect for Rights of Conscience Act'

On January 20, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) reaffirmed a rule that virtually all private health care plans must cover sterilization, abortifacients, and contraception. The rule is set to take effect August 1, 2012. Non-profit religious employers that do not now provide such coverage, and are not exempt under the rule's extremely narrow definition of religious employer, will be given one year — until August 1, 2013 — to comply.

Responding to the announcement, Cardinal-designate Timothy Dolan, archbishop of New York and president of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops, stated: "In effect, the president is saying we have a year to figure out how to violate our consciences." Cardinal-designate Dolan continued: "To force Americans to choose between violating their consciences and forgoing their healthcare is literally unconscionable. . . It is as much an attack on access to health care as on religious freedom." Noting that the Obama administration "has now drawn an unprecedented line in the sand," the Cardinal-designate urged that the HHS mandate be overturned. "The Catholic bishops are committed to working with our fellow Americans to reform the law and change this unjust regulation."

To correct the threats to religious liberty and rights of conscience posed by PPACA, the Respect for Rights of Conscience Act has been introduced in Congress (H.R. 1179, S. 1467). This measure will ensure that those who participate in the health care system "retain the right to provide, purchase, or enroll in health coverage that is consistent with their religious beliefs and moral convictions." It is more important than ever that Members of Congress be urged to co-sponsor this measure.

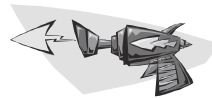
